

A Message from the **Congregation Council**

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

In November as the new Congregation Council met to organize itself for the coming year, my fellow council members elected me to serve as Council President. I am both honored and humbled by their trust, as I am by your actions in electing me to serve on our Council in the first place. With God's help, and by trusting him to lead us, I am confident we will continue to point others to his great love and do his work in this time and place.

I have no illusions concerning the challenges that are before us in the coming months and years. As those of you who attended our congregational meeting in November may remember, a number of our brothers and sisters expressed concern over the declining number of people who join us for worship each Sunday. To say that our situation simply reflects the reality for all mainline Protestant denominations in our country today is true, but I do not believe we need to accept decline and ultimate dissolution as inevitable. God's church is eternal, and what happens to us and our ministry in this place is ultimately in his hands. We must, however, do our best to discern his purpose and ensure that we prayerfully and intentionally follow his voice.

This concern over numbers represents a challenge, but it also represents a gift of opportunity. In that spirit our congregational council will come together on March 17th, 2018 to spend at least an entire day to discuss ways to address our declining numbers in worship. With God's help we know we can reverse that trend and once again fill our pews with voices raised in praise to God and his great faithfulness. I know that many of you have thoughts on this topic, and I encourage you to seek out members of council between now and March 17th and engage them in discussion. We-I-need to hear your thoughts and listen to your voices. God speaks through all of us in different ways, and the more voices we hear the more likely we will be to hear his message. The names and photos of our congregational council are posted on a bulletin board as you enter the Welcome Center, and we all are looking forward to this opportunity to have honest conversations about our future ministry opportunities in this place.

We also face some challenges with respect to our physical plant, our worship home here at 1301 Colley Avenue. For almost 90 years it has provided a place for God's people to gather and proclaim his glory, and experience the message of love, hope, and grace that permeates our Lutheran movement. As we have all noticed recently, our heating and air conditioning system is in need of replacement, and for a building of the size that we inhabit, this is done at no small cost. We face this need for a major system replacement during a time when our Spending Plan for Ministry (SPFM) cannot be fully executed within our annual contributions. I want to assure you that our congregational council is fully engaged in finding the right solutions to address the issues associated with our building, to include the challenge of funding necessary repairs. This financial deficit is, of course, related to the concern I have noted above with respect to numbers of worshipers. I also want to assure you, however, that our financial situation at present is secure. We have been blessed through the years with first fruits given by the faithful saints who have gone before us, and we have the financial ability to weather this challenge and many others. God will provide for his church. This does not mean that we are relieved of doing our part. We must continue to give our gifts not because God needs our money, but because we need to give. All that we have and are comes from him who gave it to us in the first place. Providing earthly gifts for God's ministry here is how we show our gratitude and grow in spiritual communion with God.

I was privileged to attend our Synod Assembly last June, and I hope each and every one of you will have an opportunity to do the same during your lifetime (just as I hope that at some point each and every one of you will accept an opportunity to serve on our congregational council). During the assembly we were shown a message from our Presiding Bishop, Elizabeth Eaton. Bishop Eaton reminded us that the Lutheran Movement is strong and vibrant and growing throughout the world. Even though our numbers may be in decline in the United States, we are still part of a growing church, and for that we should all be grateful and know that God's face shines upon us still. Bishop Eaton also reminded us of something so important that it bears repeating: "We only have this ministry for a short time, and this is our time." With Bishop Eaton's message in mind, and with the recent celebration of the birth of our Savior Jesus Christ in our hearts, let us together set out to do God's work in this place.
