Finance Committee

This month's spotlight on ministry is devoted to the Finance Committee. Talking about money in general can be very uncomfortable for many people, and when that conversation takes place in the context of the church, it can be downright off-putting. This is ironic because Jesus had no such qualms. I remember the first time a pastor told me that in scripture Jesus talks more about money than about anything else except the Kingdom of God. I was absolutely floored to hear that statistic, but after considering it for a bit it made perfect sense: money is the tool in this world that channels resources, and if we are going to channel resources to do God's work during our lives on this earth, we have to be familiar with this tool and use it to glorify God. Our church's Finance Committee is charged with understanding all of the aspects and uses of this important tool, and making the best possible recommendations for using it to further our ministry.

The day-to-day financial operations of our church are perhaps mundane, but are also quite important and must be carried out correctly and in a timely manner. Bills must be paid, payrolls must be properly administered, and the gifts provided in worship must be recorded and properly accounted for in records. These are some of the hundreds of transactions that take place each month to keep our church in a stable and solvent financial situation. We are blessed to have volunteers who count offerings after worship, and we are even more blessed by the hard work of our talented bookkeeper, Cathy Jones. Each year our church is subject to an Annual Compliance Review by our accounting firm of Zukerman & Associates. This year's review, completed in May, found no flaws whatsoever in our financial procedures and accounting, and that has been the case for many years running. We are indeed blessed to have an individual with Cathy's skills and diligence helping to ensure that the financial operations of our church are carried out faithfully and accurately.

The work that the Finance Committee does that is most visible to our congregation is its work in support of our annual Spending Plan For Ministry (SPFM). Each fall the Finance Committee collects input from all of the committees charged with carrying out the various areas of our ministry, and it uses that input to build a proposed SPFM for the next year. As you might imagine, the Stewardship Committee's assessment of expected gifts for the upcoming year plays a large role in constructing the annual SPFM. The congregation sees the fruits of this work each November at our Annual Congregational Meeting. That meeting also gives the Finance Committee an opportunity to report on how the congregation did in executing our past year's SPFM, and also to examine how we are doing in the final months of the current year's SPFM. The important thing for each of us to remember as a congregation member is that our voices are important. The time to help shape next year's SPFM is now. If you have a concern or idea to share concerning an area of ministry, please make your voice heard by contacting one of the members of the committee that oversees that particular area. Any one of us can provide input at any time during the year, but we are fast approaching the time when the church council must consider and forward the 2017 SPFM for consideration and approval by the congregation. All who have attended an Annual Congregational Meeting know how difficult it can be to make changes in that particular setting, so it is best to try to get your input included in the proposed plan before the November meeting. This is not to say that input is not desired during the annual meeting, because that meeting is also the one opportunity we have each year to gather together and discuss both our financial challenges and our financial opportunities, and we need everyone's voice to help us discern God's will for us in this place.

Another, perhaps less visible, aspect of the Finance Committee's work is its role in working with other areas of

ministry to develop long-range plans that require financial resources. Our congregation was recently blessed to be able to retire a building loan that was used to provide us with the updated facility in which we worship and enjoy fellowship, and which supports all of the ministries in which we are engaged. Past generations have bequeathed us a unique and beautiful worship space, and all who enter its doors find a space that can bring them closer to God. Our responsibility is to nurture what we have been given while we are here to use and preserve it, and then pass it along to the future generations of Lutheran Christians who will continue God's work in this place. In coming months the Finance Committee will be working closely with other committees, including Property and Stewardship, to ensure that we can continue to meet that responsibility while we share our time together in this place.

As faithful servants of Christ and as members of First Lutheran Church we all share in the responsibility to shape our church's ministry. A large part of that shaping process consists of developing a financial program that reflects our mission to do God's work in our broken world. Money and God's church are not incompatible. Together they create incredible opportunities to bring God's message of Love and Grace into our world. The Finance Committee is blessed to do the work that helps us to spread that message together.

Wittenberg English Ministry

ld town Lutherstadt Wittenberg, Germany, is a picturesque restored cobblestone street city on the Elbe River stretching a mile from Martin Luther's home to the ornate Castle Church where the Reformation began when he reportedly posted the 95 Theses on October 31, 1517. In between is the Town Church, filled with paintings by Cranach, where Dr. Luther composed his Sacristy Prayers and gave over 2000 sermons. It was an honor to serve for two weeks in this setting as pastor-in-residence with Wittenberg English Ministry.


My responsibilities included conducting eight worship services and being available for pastoral care to tourist and residents who spoke English. Chapel Services were held at 4 PM Wednesday-Friday in the Sacristy of St. Mary, the Town Church. Weekend worship services were held at 5 PM on Saturday, once in the Castle Church nave and once in the



nave of the Town Church. Two additional worship services where conducted to meet the time constraints of tour groups. We sang A Mighty Fortress at all of the worship services.

The world's largest museum dedicated to the Reformation is housed in Martin Luther's former home. Phillip

Melanchthon's home is three doors down and houses the museum dedicated to his work as the leading layperson who
