A Season of Renewal

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

As I write this I am still experiencing the joy that comes with our Easter celebration. These last several weeks I have watched spring announcing itself, and it seems that all of God's creation is reminding me that death is always overcome by new life. As "Easter people," we know this in our hearts, but if you are like me there are many times throughout the year when I find it difficult to see beyond the cares of this life to the hope and promise given to us by that empty tomb. During those times I find it helpful to open my eyes to the Easter blessings that surround me every day, and I want to take this opportunity to tell you about some that I am seeing right here at First Lutheran Church.

I first want to update you on our ongoing journey of Mission and Ministry Renewal. This is the process that our council and pastors have agreed to lead this year as we prepare for next year's observance of our 125th year of Lutheran Christian ministry in this place. During Lent we began our journey by listening to God during our shared 40 Days of Prayer. Later in March our council and pastors spent a day with our Mission and Ministry Renewal facilitator, Pastor John Mocko. We are now entering the next phase of our journey, one in which we will take time to listen to one another. Each of us will have an opportunity to participate in the Congregational Vitality Survey, which will be available for the congregation to complete on either of two successive Sundays in May, May 13th and May 20th. I encourage all of our members, even those who do not attend worship on a regular basis, to attend during one of those Sundays to help make this survey as meaningful and helpful as possible. If you know members who perhaps have not attended in some time, please encourage them to join in worship on one of those two Sundays. Pastor Mocko will report the survey results to us on Sunday June 3rd, a date upon which we will hold a single worship service in order to ensure we have a suitable opportunity to learn about and discuss the survey results. As our journey continues we will establish a Mission and Ministry Renewal Leadership Team to help guide this important work and moving into the summer months we will be going out into the community to listen to our neighbors as they consider our role in the community. All of this input will allow us to

identify our strengths as a congregation, as well as those areas we need to build up. In the fall our pastors, council, and the Mission and Ministry Renewal Leadership Team will take all that we learn by listening and set aside another day to work together.



During that session we will identify work that needs to be done and set goals and timelines, so that in our 125th anniversary year we will be walking the path to congregational vitality for another 125 years.

I also want to update you on the work we are doing on our building. We were blessed last year to retire the mortgage that funded the last set of major renovations to our building. Our sound stewardship in caring for that debt has enabled us this year to pay cash to replace our aged heating and air conditioning system with a modern, reliable, and fuel-efficient system. As I write this note we await only the city's issuance of the requisite permits in order for the contractor, Chesapeake Controls, to begin installation. I expect that by the time you are reading this article work will have already begun. This important system replacement will preserve our building and allow us to use it comfortably in all seasons for years to come. We recently were also able to purchase a new sound system for our Nave. While the new system has needed some tweaks in its first weeks of use (perhaps we should think of these weeks as a "sea trial"), the pastors, staff, and council will continue to work with the installers to ensure the new system lives up to its promise. Both the heating/ air conditioning and sound systems fall into the category of systems that serve us best when they do not call attention to themselves, and that is our goal! It is clear to me that as a congregation we are meeting the challenge of being good stewards of this wonderful home for ministry with which we have been entrusted.

A Season of Renewal

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I also want to touch upon a new ministry here at FLC. As many of you heard in Pastor Goeres' sermon on April 8th, our congregation has entered into a relationship with a fellow Christian congregation, the Catholic Basilica of St. Mary's. St. Mary's history as a predominantly African-American congregation, and our history as a predominantly white congregation, provide an opportunity to use our shared community in Christ to break down racial divisions that plague our community and nation. While we are in the very beginning stages of this relationship, as it matures I am confident it will remind us all that anything is possible through the love of Christ.

Finally, I want to let you know that we continue on a path of financial stability. Over the past several months we have been blessed with approximately \$100,000 in earnings from our endowment. While the bulk of that money will be applied to the property projects discussed above, our council decided to allocate

a tithe of those earnings toward work that will have an impact beyond this place and time. We are using some of that money to help fund our current Young Adult in Global Mission, Samantha Dibiaso, as she continues her year of work in South Africa. You can read an excerpt from one of her blog entries in this same issue of The Contact. Another portion is being set aside to match a portion of the monies that our youth are raising to pay for their trip to the National Lutheran Youth Gathering in Houston in the summer, with an additional equivalent match being put toward a community ministry opportunity that our council will decide upon in a shared conversation with our FLC youth. I am grateful that our church has been, and continues to be, blessed with such devoted stewards making it possible for us to share our blessings in this world.

FLC and St. Mary's Meet

ast month marked 50 years since the tragic assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., a dark day in the history of race relations in our country. Being mindful that our journey toward racial reconciliation is ongoing, members of our Church Council have reached out to one of Norfolk's African-American congregations, St. Mary's Catholic Basilica on Chapel Street. On February 5th, three members of St. Mary's Parish Council met with the FLC Church Council, and that visit was reciprocated on March 13th with five of our Council members meeting with their Council. These initial meetings served the purpose of getting acquainted and asking how our two congregations might help each other in addressing issues of race that so deeply divide our society. The meetings were quite

gratifying, and it was decided that we should continue to build on our relationship.

This initiative recognizes our Christian responsibility to do what we can in honestly facing the evil of racism. Establishing a relationship with an African-American congregation gives us a unique opportunity to contribute toward building a spirit of Christian love and understanding in a strife-ridden society. Each congregation will form a committee to work with each other in planning activities that will serve our purpose. Watch for further information on this venture. Offering of Letters for Refugees

In September 2017 the Administration announced that the U.S. would reduce refugee arrivals to 45,000 for 2018 fiscal year, the lowest allocation in the history of our nation's resettlement program. We are now at the mid-year mark of FY 2018 and, as of March 19, 2018, the U.S, had welcomed fewer than 10,000 refugees. "Breaking Bread Together," from March 28, 2018

My dear friend Mama Golo likes to make this delicious bread we call dumpling, "le dumbolo" in Tswana. I absolutely love it! I always look forward to when she brings me a slice or two once a month. She always smiles and says, "Mama Samanta come and eat your dumpling!" On Sunday I picked up my ingredients at the local tuck shop and walked over to her house. I was surprised when she said I only needed a few things! I was surprised at how simple the whole process really was. The prep time took only a few minutes, and Mama Golo showed me that what was most important was a lot of time and good company.

I was so thankful for Mama Golo to go out of her way to teach me how to make dumpling. But actually our work didn't stop there! As we waiting for the dumpling, we cooked A LOT! Typically people in my community spend their Sundays cooking after church and serve it throughout the week. Together we cooked so many things! The more we cooked together the more I wished I had done this Together we cooked so many things! The more we cooked together the more I wished I had done this more with my neighbors back home. As I live and experience this year in SA, I continue to reflect on how much I have let time negatively impact my relationships with others. And why is that? We are socialized to prioritize time, to have a full schedule. "Sorry, I'm busy." Maybe I've gone through the socialized to prioritize time, to have a full schedule. "Sorry, I'm busy." Maybe I've gone through the motions of "breaking bread together," but there is more to it. As Mama Golo and I chatted about life and hummed to the radio in the kitchen, I found a sense of comfort in losing track of the time. She are late.

Now when I think of breaking bread together, it's more than just the pieces of bread. It's about taking time that's not on a schedule for others. Its about being vulnerable and not the expert. It's about the process, not the end result. It's an invitation to learn and listen. It's about literally breaking down barriers and sharing stories with one another. And it's all these things that actually fulfill us every day.
