From our Council President

It was a blessing in my life to be able to attend the annual synod assembly again this year. While there were no "attention grabbing" matters before the assembly this year, such as choosing a new bishop, we did take care of some important business. We elected individuals to fill vacancies on the Synod Council, and we elected our synod's representatives to the 2019 ELCA Churchwide Assembly. We also witnessed the installation of the Rev. Kelly Bayer Derrick as Assistant to the Bishop, and our own Deacon Lisa Geiger as the synod's Candidacy Process Administrator. Lisa will continue to serve as our FLC Operations Manager, as the Candidacy Process Administrator position is a part-time volunteer position. I give thanks for her willingness to devote her spare time to this important need in our synod. One other business item worthy of special note was a resolution that we voted to send forward to our upcoming ELCA Churchwide Assembly. This resolution recognizes the 50th year of ordaining women in the ELCA and its predecessor bodies, and calls for renewed efforts to ensure that our church compensates those who serve it in paid positions equally regardless of gender. In deciding all of these matters we were mindful of our role as God's servants to carry out his work on this earth.

As I reflect on what it meant to me to be able to attend this assembly, one thing continues to stand out: how much our church is doing, and as our Presiding Bishop, Elizabeth Eaton, reminds us, how connected we are as "church together." Sometimes it is easy to become overwhelmed by all that is before us at First Lutheran Norfolk: the needs generated by our desire to be good stewards of our worship space, the many voices that must be acknowledged as we examine our ministry in this place and time, and our call to be God's hands in tending to the brokenness that is all around us. Our recent vitality survey, in which we were given an opportunity to listen to one another, reminded us of so much that is vibrant and healthy in our life together here at FLC, as well as of those areas which require more of our care and attention. That process of listening, to God, to each other, and, as the process moves forward, to our neighbors, will continue in the coming months. I rejoice that together we are undertaking this important activity as we contemplate next year's anniversary celebration of our youthful 125 years as a congregation.

The synod assembly, however, reminded me of how we at FLC are part of something so much larger than our own congregation. Did you know that our synod provides support, including financial support, to fellow Lutherans in Papua New Guinea? That in this time when our church is seeking ways to address a nationwide shortage in rostered leaders, our synod provides sustained financial support to our Lutheran seminaries? That our synod provides support to outdoor ministries at Caroline Furnace Camp and Hungry Mother camp? Those are just a few examples of ways in which each of us, by being part of FLC and sharing the gifts God has given us, are making a difference in our state, and, by virtue of being part of the Lutheran movement, in our world. Listening to the good news of what Lutheran Christians are doing in our world reminded me that we are truly a church together doing God's work.

From conversations I have had over the past years, I know there is perception among members of our congregation that only council members can be chosen to represent our congregation at the annual synod assembly (with the exception of the youth who attend the annual Virginia Synod Youth Assembly). That is absolutely not true, and I hope each of you will consider whether you might be able to make time to attend next year's assembly. Beginning in January the church council will begin recruiting some non-council members to attend in June 2019, and if you are interested in being one of those attendees please make your desires known to the pastors, me, or any council member. At this assembly the synod began a discussion about ways we might change the format, timing, and even location of our annual synod assembly, so stay tuned—someday the Virginia Synod Annual Assembly may be coming to a location near us!

<u>Stewardship in Action</u> "Where there's a Wil"

Because I was raised as a Methodist, I've always had some unanswered questions regarding confirmation and what is all about. Doing a little investigating, I learned that Confirmation in the Lutheran church provides people the opportunity to affirm for themselves the promises that parents, sponsors, and congregations made for them at baptism. That led me to another question. How does a person prepare to be confirmed?

Here at First the lay expert on confirmation is Wil Thompson who teaches the 7th and 8th grade Sunday School/Confirmation class. I met with Wil over coffee and he answered my questions about confirmation at First, and also how he became involved in it.

Wil has taught Sunday School since he was a senior in high school, when he taught sixth grade boys. At that time, he was living in Colorado, and his church often had interns from a nearby Baptist seminary. Those interns worked with the youth and made a lasting impression on Wil.

When he joined First in 2004, his intention was never to just "attend" church. He wanted to be involved. Two weeks later, at the suggestion of then Associate Pastor Jay Gamelin, he began teaching the high school Sunday School Class. When Jay left, Associate Pastor Nathan Gragg convinced him to take on the confirmation Sunday School class. While Jay envisioned a more individual concept for confirmation, Pastor Gragg wanted the instruction to be more communal. When Pastor Goeres came, he suggested using the current curriculum, Co-laborate, which is endorsed by the ELCA.

Wil explained that since the curriculum is taught on a rolling basis it doesn't matter where in the curriculum students begin. Typically, a student finishes in June of their eighth-grade year. That summer, they develop a relationship with a mentor, and over the course of four to six meetings will discuss issues like how the mentor's faith affects them in work, in their family, and in social settings. The goal for each confirmand is to build a relationship with an adult who is not a part of their typical circle, that is, someone besides family members and pastors.

Wil readily admits that as a teacher he doesn't have all the answers. Classes are discussion based, and he encourages his students by letting them know that their thoughts are as valid as his. He observed that confirmation class may be one of the first places students realize that someone - Mom, Dad,



teacher - won't tell them the right answer. He encourages his students to read scripture and to think for themselves.

In addition to working directly with students in the classroom, Wil communicates with parents nearly every week updating them on what had been covered in class and issues that might be raised. He hopes that discussions will continue around the dinner table.

I was impressed by the time and effort Wil puts in to his class and by his obvious respect and affection for his students. He says he is struck by their insights and values their opinions. Seeing them develop in their faith is extremely rewarding for him. At a recent congregational meeting, several of his students spoke up, expressing their views on issues facing our congregation. I'm sure that I was not the only person who was impressed and proud of them, as I am sure Wil certainly is.
