Rejoicing in Service for 125 years...

on LUTHERAN CHUR an Pervice has been an integral part of the mission of First Lutheran since the congregation's founding. Although short on details, early church records reference efforts by the congregation to help the needy in Norfolk. Dr. Luther Strickler, while guiding the design 1894 of our present building, felt the importance of service so strongly that he incorporated the ·IS3 theme of "Unselfish Service" into one of the clerestory windows. That window (next to the balcony on the courtyard side of the sanctuary) depicts Christ washing the feet of the disciples and Dorcas distributing clothes to the needy.

How have we remained mindful of the importance of service to those in our community over the past 125 years? This congregation has cared for those in need through lunch ministry and NEST. Our members have worked with Meals on Wheels, delivering food to the sick and to the elderly. We have built or improved homes through Habitat for Humanity and A Brush With Kindness. A longtime tradition during December was to fill Christmas goodie bags at the Seamen's Center for those sailors who found themselves far from home during the holidays. At Thanksgiving, we have filled food bags for Ghent Area Ministry. The Prayer Shawl Ministry knitted or crocheted prayer shawls for those who were ill or in crisis.

For over forty years, First has participated in the Ghent Area Red Cross Blood Drive, making it one of our longest running service projects. In contrast, Laundry Love, hosted by several churches in Ghent, is one of newest. For the last two years, a few volunteers have enjoyed getting to know our neighbors while providing them with laundry debit cards, detergent and fellowship.

There have indeed been a wide variety of programs and opportunities for service over the past 125 years. Recognizing the many opportunities for service both through our congregation and through other organizations in our area, the Anniversary Committee is challenging the congregation to perform 125 acts of service during the month of March. The blood drive on March 13 is a perfect opportunity to serve, either by giving blood or by volunteering. Many of you already aid others by cooking or serving meals for Lunch Ministry. Others may want to help Christian Service on March 26 by tying knots in quilts for Lutheran World Relief.

Our Way Rejoicing
The acts of service don't all need to be done through our church, however. Our members serve as volunteers in schools, in local hospitals like King's Daughters and Lake Taylor, and with organizations such as the Rotary Club and scouting. Civic leagues certainly host worthwhile service projects like recycling and food drives that need volunteers.

Help our younger members find ways they can serve, possibly by helping others with school assignments or taking cookies to an elderly neighbor. Even a simple act of service can be a huge help to someone else. Be creative! Look for opportunities to serve.

Once you have completed your act of service, fill out one of the sheets available in the Welcome Center with your name and what you did. The sheets will be posted on the doors to the sanctuary or around the Welcome Center. By the end of March, we hope any blank spaces in our building will be covered!

If you need more inspiration, look at the bulletin board in the Welcome Center for ideas and also read these words of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. "Life's most persistent and urgent question is, What are you doing for others?" Members of First Lutheran have been answering that question for 125 years. How will you answer it during March?

Winter Celebration

G aith in Action," based on I John 3:18 – "Little children, let us love not in word and speech, but in truth and action" and Luke 10:25-37 (The parable of the Good Samaritan), was presented as a team of independent movie makers who ran into a problem that threatened to end their project altogether. Like those in the parable who crossed by on the other side, the crew members in turn each avoided taking any responsibility for solving the crisis, all the while overlooking one crew member who had been ready to come to the rescue from the beginning.

The goal of our time together at Winter Celebration was, first, for all participants to tell their stories of faith, doubt, and action in light of the Good Samaritan parable, and second, for them to reflect on the gospel's call to reach out to those who are marginalized, uncertain, or hurt.

Music In Our Schools

In Our Schools is a campaign, now celebrating its 30th year, by the National Association for Music Education, which seeks to raise awareness of the importance of music education. It serves as an opportunity for music teachers to bring their programs to the attention of the community, and to display the benefits that music brings to students of all ages.

First Lutheran has a unique opportunity for outreach through the music ministry. Ryan-Michael Blake, the Director of Music, also works in the music department for Norfolk Public Schools. In addition, some of the professional singers in the choir are also music educators: Ajeé Church is the chorus teacher at Granby High School and Patrick Garrison is the chorus teacher at Maury High School. Over the past three years, students from both schools have contributed to our worship, and the advanced choruses from both schools combined to present a Memorial Day concert last year. But these are only the outward and visible connections which reflect a much larger initiative between our church and the schools in our community.

We are working to strengthen our relationships with all the schools in our neighborhood; namely W.H. Taylor Elementary, the Ghent Academy, Blair Middle, and Maury High. Other ministry programs at FLC already provide support to these schools in other ways. The relationship with Maury, in particular, goes farther back than anyone realized. Before the congregation moved to the current Colley Avenue location, the church was located at the intersection of 15th Street and Moran Avenue. The streets have been renamed since the 1920s and 15th and Moran is where you will find Maury High School, placing FLC right across the street. At the time of this writing, the extent of collaboration from that period to the present is being investigated.

Nowadays, the FLC/Maury partnership is visited four days a week, as Mr. Blake and Mr. Garrison work together in their respective capacities, and each institution benefits from the other's resources. For example, First Lutheran provides the use of its facilities for lessons and workshops; has donated much-needed office furniture which no longer served the needs of the congregation; contributes to an exchange of instructional resources; and, through the generosity of Mary Davenport Zelasko, provides for the care and alteration of the chorus dresses and suits. In response, students and teachers from Maury enhance our worship from time to time with glorious music; and the





band program provides percussion instruments (timpani, chimes, cymbals, etc) for our festival services, as well as auxiliary instruments and equipment as we explore music from around the world. Did you know that the wreaths which decorate the outside of the church during December come from the Maury orchestra?

Sunday, March 31 will be our first *Music In Our Schools* Sunday. At the 11:00 a.m. service, the FLC choir will be joined by a soloist from Maury High School and accompanied by students from Booker T. Washington High School. After the service, we will host our first *Instrument Petting Zoo.* Mrs. Danielle Roby, Senior Coordinator for Music Education for Norfolk Public Schools, will be in attendance to provide guidance for parents of children who are considering participation in the music program at their local school.

Plans are being made to host an annual concert (presented by faculty, students, and alumni) to benefit the Roby Memorial



At our February meeting, the Congregation Council

- Opened with a devotion using Pastrix by Pastor Nadia Boltz-Weber
- Received a presentation from Officer Jo Ann Hughes on Safety and Security for our building and grounds. Asked Property and Grounds committees to develop a plan based on Officer Hughes' recommendations
- Approved the following motions from Finance:
- Transfer of \$14,336.35 from the Council Discretionary Restricted account to operating cash account which represents the remaining deficit from 2018 operations.
- Transfer of \$35,000.00 out of the currently available excess funds in the real estate checking account to the Building Fund Restricted account.
- Increase the Pledge account by \$76,362.00 of the 2019 Spending Plan for Ministry to reflect the


actual amount pledged to date, with a corresponding reduction in the Non-Pledge Offerings account.

- Approved a motion from Global Concerns to donate \$500 to Iglesia Luterana Cristo Rey, an ELCA congregation in El Paso, Texas for their work as a Welcoming Congregation.
- Connected projects with committees and asked that they be prioritized and assigned a completion date.
- Identified June 1st as the retreat date for Council and Leadership Team to conclude the Congregational Vitality process.
- Approved a motion to make \$14,000 available from the building fund for the reception room renovation work.
- Shared blessings, prayer concerns and prayer partners
