# What exactly is the "Hymn of the Day"?

nyone who has worshiped in a Lutheran church since 1978 has seen this term. Over the past 40 years, several liturgical scholars have used a lot of sophisticated words to describe what makes this particular hymn unique. In the transition from *Lutheran Book of Worship* to *Evangelical Lutheran Worship*, these scholars seem to have made an almost 180° turn in their definitions. A workshop on the topic was offered at the last national conference of the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians (ALCM), and I was hopeful that it would provide more insight. Alas, I am still stuck with the question: "What makes this hymn different from any of the other hymns in the service?"

Historically, what we now know as the Hymn of the Day comes from the tradition of the *de tempore* hymn which provided specific texts (both canonical and catechetical) to each Sunday and festival of the church year. This tradition predates Luther's reforms, but he is credited with its renewal and revitalization, authoring many new hymns himself. J.S. Bach, always having to be "extra" (as the kids say) took this a few steps further, composing an entire cantata for every service, incorporating many chorales which Lutherans sing to this day, although most have escaped the American Lutheran repertoire.

Traditionally, at least among Lutheran churches in the American South, this hymn is often erroneously referred to as the "sermon hymn," (because it is usually sung either before or after the sermon) and was selected by the pastor(s) as a complement to the preaching. Conversely, in concept, the Hymn of the Day is selected by the churchwide body (in this case the ELCA), much like the lectionary readings. At present, Augsburg Fortress alone publishes four lists for Hymn of the Day plans which seem to contradict one another. For the past year we have been following the one on the *Church Year Calendar* with occasional diversion for pastoral discretion.

Carl Schalk, noted Lutheran composer and author, articulated the following among many practical outcomes that the regular use of the Hymn of the Day plan provides: 1) it protects the congregation against too-frequent subjectivism and one-sidedness in the use of the hymnal, and 2) it helps the church musician plan far in advance so that he does not have to wait until shortly before Sunday to find out which hymns are to be sung.

I regard this as an extension of what Bach considered "a well-ordered church music." I've put a new spin on it by trying to create a balanced diet to suit the palates of those who worship at FLC. Some of you have heard me use the term "musical buffet" to describe the many and various styles and genres. Lutheran chorales (including the more obscure ones), English hymns, Taize chants, gospel songs, Asian melodies, African rhythms, jazz, and more are all included in *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* and, appropriately, all are welcome as candidates for the Hymn of the Day. Rather than attempt these pieces as solo presentations during communion as we have done, over the next year we will be using the time after the sermon as an opportunity to:

- find our voice in the expression of other cultures and languages;
- explore some of Luther's historic chorales and other hymns of the time;
- discover texts and tunes which have been penned in recent decades; and
- enjoy refreshment in some old favorites which may have become stale.

Some of these require some instruction or guidance which is more feasible to provide than any of the other opportunities in which hymns are sung in worship. I will also include more detailed information and sometimes even recordings in the weekly *Notes on Music* email, resuming this month.

My hope is that you will taste something new at this banquet and still come back the next week for something different. Sometimes you might even ask for the recipe! And remember that sometimes in life we have to take "no thank you" bites.

# **Junior High Servant Event – 2019**

t this year's Junior High Servant Event (JHSE) in July, four youth from First Lutheran joined 29 others from around the synod to spend a week in the Tidewater area learning, serving, worshiping God, and having a great time. We learned about the causes of homelessness, the obstacles and hardships faced by people living in homelessness, and what services are available to help them. As we heard the stories of people whose lives were turned upside-down, often by situations that were out of their control such as unexpected illness and high medical bills or job loss, we also gained empathy for their situation and for the difficulties they face in finding food, shelter, health care, and community. One of the places we served, PIN (People in Need) Ministry, provides community and care for those who are living in homelessness or struggling with poverty by serving meals, providing basic health care and assessments, and offering many other services such as a clothing closet, recovery groups, and opportunities for worship. We served dinner there one evening, and many youth preferred to sit with the guests and talk with them. The laughter and smiles which followed were a joy to witness as our youth interacted with these guests as people and individuals with dignity who are loved and precious and not as a stereotype.

We also spent a lot of time learning about the immigration crisis in our country. We were visited by Ms. Sharon Powell, an immigration attorney from Williamsburg who is also a member of St. Stephens Lutheran Church. She spoke about how those seeking asylum in our country make up just one component under the umbrella of legal immigration, and she shared stories of families that are seeking asylum not only because of the danger and violence that they face in their home



countries but also because of the economic effects of climate change upon their families. She did a great job in explaining some of the nuances of immigration law which could affect a person's claim of asylum. In thanksgiving for her visit, we donated (through our registration fee and accrued savings) \$1200.00 to cover the court fees of one of her clients.

In keeping with the theme of immigration, we also experienced a simulation created by AAMPARO (https://www.elca.org/ammparo), in which youth took on the various roles of people affected by immigration, including migrant families, border control offices, a US Congressman, a teacher, and an aid worker. And finally, to put hands and feet to what we had been learning, we made burritos and care bags for an organization called TITA (Tidewater Immigration Transportation Assistance), which meets immigrants at the bus stop and helps them on the next step of their journey. We realized that we may not be able

to affect the immigration crisis on a large scale, but we can make a small difference locally.

And finally, the Junior High Servant Event is not complete without time near the ocean. We went on a Dolphin Cruise (and saw lots of dolphins, including babies!), and spent an afternoon playing in the surf and sand, with the added bonus of Pastor Dave Delaney and intern Samantha DiBiaso joining us!


