The Morning Blessing

n the morning, as soon as you get out of bed, you are to make the sign of the holy cross and say: "God the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit watch over me. Amen."

Then, kneeling or standing, say the Apostles' Creed and the Lord's Prayer. If you wish, you may in addition recite this little prayer as well:

"I give thanks to you, heavenly Father, through Jesus Christ your dear Son, that you have protected me through the night from all harm and danger. I ask that you would also protect me today from sin and all evil, so that my life and actions may please you. Into your hands I commend myself: my body, my soul, and all that is mine. Let your holy angel be with me, so that the wicked foe may have no power over me. Amen."

After singing a hymn perhaps (for example, one on the Ten Commandments) or whatever else may serve your devotion, you are to go to your work joyfully.

The Evening Blessing

In the evening, when you go to bed, you are to make the sign of the holy cross and say: "God the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit watch over me. Amen."

Then, kneeling or standing, say the Apostles' Creed and the Lord's Prayer. If you wish, you may in addition recite this little prayer as well:

"I give thanks to you, heavenly Father, through Jesus Christ your dear Son, that you have graciously protected me today. I ask you to forgive all my sins, where I have done wrong, and graciously to protect me tonight. Into your hands I commend myself: my body, my soul, and all that is mine. Let your holy angel be with me, so that the wicked foe may have no power over me. Amen."

Then you are to go to sleep quickly and cheerfully.


We collected 23 units of blood, which could help nearly seventy patients in need.

At our March meeting, the Congregation Council

- Opened with devotions on listening to God
- Changed Spending Plan for Ministry in 2021 to Ministry Investment Plan based on insights from VA Synod's EPIC event in January
- Gave thanks for Betty Pittman, Sexton, who started February 24 working 20 hours a week, Sunday-Thursday
- Discussed attendance at our VA Synod Assembly June 12/13
- Designated \$2,500 to our VA Synod towards a \$125,000.00 matching grant from the Lily Foundation to support educational debt reduction for rostered ministers and stewardship education for congregations in our Synod
- Congregational Vitality Work: updates

A. Small Group Ministry: heard plans to share the positive "buzz" about the groups

B. Welcoming Visitors and Communications:

Safety and Security plan—approved beginning the work to lower shrubs to 3' and raise tree canopies as well as remove limbs overhanging the building. Improving lighting outside and inside is in the works

Palm Sunday Home Worship Sunday, April 5, 2020

Let us gather together around a home altar, inviting friends and loved ones in other places to join in worship virtually.

Opening Prayer: Sovereign God, you have established your rule in the human heart through the servanthood of Jesus Christ. By your Spirit, keep us in the joyful procession of those who with their tongues confess Jesus as Lord and with their lives praise him as Savior, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

Gospel reading: Matthew 21:1-11

Feel free to read the Gospel passage two or three times, from different versions of the Bible, with different readers each time, and listen carefully to each reading.

What words or images caught your attention as you listened? What is Jesus doing in this passage? Why do you think Jesus does this? How did the crowed respond to Jesus? Why do you think they were so excited to see Jesus? Why do you think the people in Jerusalem (vs. 10) were in turmoil and shaken? What would you do if you knew Jesus was coming to your town in a parade? What questions do you have about this story? Finish this sentence: "When I hear this story about Jesus, I feel..."

You may choose to sing or speak together "All Glory, Laud, and Honor"

Blessing of the Palms

If palms branches are not available, branches of other trees and shrubs may be used, or you may make palm branches out of paper (a template is available at the end of this service). You are invited to gather outside if you wish, and process around the perimeter of your home or around your neighborhood. You may also choose to process around your home, doing a house blessing as you move from room to room.

The Lord be with you.

And also with you.

Let us pray.

We praise you, O God, for redeeming the world through our Savior Jesus Christ. Today he entered the holy city in triumph and was proclaimed messiah and king by those who spread garments and branches along his way. Bless these branches and those who carry them. Grant us grace to follow our Lord in the way of the cross, so that, joined to his death and resurrection, we enter into life with you; through the same Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. **Amen.**

Procession Through Your Home and Blessing of a Dwelling

With your palms, gather at the entrance

Peace to this house and to all who enter here. A reading from Proverbs: By wisdom a house is built, and through understanding it is established; through knowledge its rooms are filled with rare and beau-tiful treasures. (Proverbs 24:3-4)

A reading from Psalms: The Lord shall watch over your going out and your coming in, from this time forth forever more. (Psalm 121:8)

Let us pray: O God, watch over this family (say names) in all their going out and their coming in; keep all evil away from their door; and let them share the hospitality of this home with all who visit, that those who enter here may know your love and peace. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen.

A place where common activities are shared, such as a living room

A reading from Ecclesiastes: So I commend enjoyment, for there is nothing better for people under the sun than to eat, and drink, and enjoy themselves, for this will go with them in their toil through the days of life that God gives them under the sun. (Ecclesiastes 8:15)

Let us pray: O God, you set apart time for rest and enjoyment of the world you made. Bless those who gather here for fellowship and recreation, that they may be renewed and refreshed. Amen.

A place for preparing and sharing the gift of food, such as the kitchen and/or dining rom

A reading from the Psalms: The eyes of all wait upon you, O Lord, and you give them their food in due season. You open wide your hand and satisfy the desire of every living thing. (Psalm 145:15-16)

Let us pray: Blessed are you, Creator of heaven and earth, for you give us food and drink to sustain our lives and make our hearts glad. Make us grateful for all your mercies, and mindful of the needs of others. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen.

A place of rest and renewal

A reading from the Psalms: In peace, I will lie down and sleep; for you alone, O Lord, make me rest secure. (Psalm 4:8)

Let us pray: Guide us waking, O Lord, and guard us sleeping, that awake we may watch with Christ, and asleep we may rest in peace. Amen.

When all have returned to the common space:

A reading from Isaiah: The effect of righteousness will be peace, and the result of righteousness, quietness and trust forever. My people will abide in a peaceful habitation, in secure dwellings, and in quiet resting places. (Isaiah 32:17-18)

O God, we pray that you will bless this home and those who live here with your gracious presence, that your love may be their inspiration, your wisdom their guide; your truth their light, and your peace their benediction; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Lord, remember us in your kingdom, and teach us to pray: Our Father in heaven...

The Lord watch over your going out and your coming in, from this time forth and forevermore. Amen.
