

Singing the Lord's song in a strange land

keep coming back to a statement I made a few months ago: "The way we do church music is about to be very different because the way we do church is going to be very different." And that is most certainly true. Every aspect of our daily lives has changed and we've all had to quickly overcome any deficiencies in our awareness of technology, so that we may continue to function in our schools, our workplaces, among distant relatives, and our society. But despite the tendency to focus on how things are not the same, I am still amazed at the ways God is still creating and in the ways that God is making all things new.

I participated in a series of eight webinars this summer, focusing mostly on strategies for safe engagement within music programs as we begin the regathering process. This included my introduction to new (and in some cases, not new at all) resources which I will be using even past this time of Covidtide. We are able to do things in a different way than we may or may not have "always done," and we are also able to do some things we were previously unable to do. The handbell ensembles are back in rehearsal and the beginning guitar class is making good progress. We look forward to hearing from them in worship in the coming weeks and months. Choir is still a while from coming back, but it will come back, along with other opportunities for music-making.

Music as Spiritual Care will begin on Sunday, October 18, which, coincidentally, is the Feast of St. Luke, the evangelist who was known as a physician. The session will include an introduction to various relaxation techniques as well as demonstrations of ways in which music can be used to relieve tension and anxiety. At this time, due to COVID-19 restrictions, this session will be recorded.

Still with uncertainty as to the exact particulars surrounding the regathering process, Pastor Mims and I have been discussing how to present All Saints Day and Christmas Eve in a manner that will be modified and distanced, while also being familiar and intimate. If you spend even a few seconds thinking about the traditions, you will appreciate the gravity of the challenge before us. The worship committee met recently via Zoom to explore some options which included a combination of recorded and in-person possibilities. If you have ideas, please be in touch with a committee member, Pastor Mims, or myself.


