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# Following the Example of Jesus – Self-Care

n one of our Women's Bible Study sessions, we focused on Mark 6:45-56. Many would say this portion of scripture focuses on another miracle performed by Jesus, as He shows His authority over nature and walks on water.

But I would ask you to look a little closer, especially at verses 45-46. I would say the "miracle" in this passage is Jesus actually attending to himself, providing for himself what every human being needs at one time or another, an opportunity for self-care.

"As soon as the meal was finished, Jesus insisted that the disciples get in the boat and go on ahead across to Bethsaida while he dismissed the congregation. After sending them off, he climbed a mountain to pray."

Mark 6:45-56 - The Message

To begin, self-care is not being selfish. Self-care is an act of love and generosity not only to ourselves, but to our families, to our congregations, to our ministries and even to our God. We give our best, rested and energized self to His Kingdom work. Selfcare is a part of our calling as baptized believers.

For it has been shown that if we do not take care of ourselves, we will be in no shape to take care of others.

Have you ever been on an airplane? In the instructions from the flight crew, we are told that in the event of an emergency, to put the oxygen mask on ourselves first, then assist others who may need help.

In this scripture passage, Jesus not only takes care of himself, but also the disciples. The Scripture actually tells us that Jesus "insisted" the disciples get into the boat to go to the other side. The disciples acted like folks who feel they can go and go and go without recharging their batteries, so to speak. But Jesus knew the importance of time away from the hustle and bustle of ministry.

So, Jesus sets the example for us. He gets away from the people, He gets away from the disciples. And He gets away by himself. Jesus took time off to refresh himself mentally, physically, and most importantly spiritually.

Jesus made time to be in prayer with His Father. Prayer was Jesus' "picker-upper". What is yours? Is it prayer, silence and solitude, scripture reading, walking in nature, listening/singing along to music? What is it that refreshes your spirit? What is it that gives you the strength and the courage and the vitality to move on to the next opportunity?

There's an old saying that I would like to give a new interpretation. I am sure you are familiar with the acronym JOY. It stands for Jesus, Others, Yourself. Most people take this literally and find themselves worn out with nothing left to give. For some reason we have been led to believe that caring for our own welfare is not "Christ-like", but we could not be farther from the truth.

So, let's take a new spin on JOY.

How about, Jesus, Ourselves, and Y'all (my Texas roots!). We follow the example of Jesus when we take adequate care of ourselves, and then we can effectively minister and care for others.

Take Care of Yourself!

# "Troubling the Waters"

e are sure our readers would agree that we are living in turbulent times. Issues of social justice are dominating the headlines, igniting strong feelings and ideological divisions. Just at the time we need rational conversation and effective communication, these tensions incite hostility and confrontation. It is encouraging to see how our church, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, has taken the initiative in creating insightful, positive materials in addressing the evils of racism. The theme of "Repentance, Reconciliation, Reparation," has been lifted up as the goal for our society in seeking to heal the brokenness which divides us.

Our own congregation has embarked on a particular mission of healing in reaching out to the African American congregation, the Basilica of St. Mary's Catholic Church. Members of each congregation have been meeting together on a monthly basis, resulting in an interracial group of Christians committed to bringing a Christian witness to the cause of social justice. Calling ourselves Christians United for Social Change (CUSC), the group made its witness in the Confederate Monuments issue, featuring a trip to Richmond with several members speaking from the steps of the State Capitol. Currently our attention is focused on the issue of affordable housing, where a massive effort is taking place by federal and local governments to literally transform the St. Paul area east of downtown Norfolk. CUSC sponsored a zoomed meeting on May 12 in which the leadership of the Norfolk Redevelopment and Housing Authority presented the details of the project and fielded questions from the CUSC and other local and statewide organizations that we had invited to attend.

Summing up, we are very pleased to be making our witness as two congregations, Black and White, on behalf of justice for black citizens in our state and local community. It is a faithinspired activity on behalf of a minority of our nation who have for too long been victimized by the majority.

Unfortunately, the church itself is not immune to this. In fact, there is a long history of ideological divisions and resentments within the religious community. When it comes to racism, for example, we can expect a heightened concern within the church to combat it, but we can differ on where we see it and how to deal with it. We all seek racial justice and peace within our society, but how do the resources of Christian faith help us to achieve it?



There should at least be little question about the profound impact of white racism over centuries of slavery, Jim Crow, and continuing discrimination. A particular gift that white Christians should be able to bring to this question is the willingness to recognize our complicity as a dominant white society in maintaining the burden of white racism. A Christian response is a spirit of repentance in our society. Over centuries it has become deeply embedded in our thinking and attitudes, establishing assumptions and expectations that have created a mis-shaped identity among us Whites. We have been living within a context of white privilege that we have taken for granted, with consequences we are prone not to recognize. As Christians we hold to a theological conviction which should help us in frankly facing this condition. It provides the first step in a realistic and hopeful response to racism. In recognizing our nature as sinful creatures, we can acknowledge the self-centered character of our lives. Yes, we are capable of self-esteem which invites us to denigrate others if it serves to elevate ourselves.

Admittedly, recognizing this truth does not automatically solve the problem of racism, but it does enable the capacity for selfcriticism where we are able to acknowledge our mistakes.


