received a world they developed and tended. We are also leaving a legacy, whether we do so intentionally or not. Our stewardship to generations to come is all about the way we are stewards of life now."



# "Troubling the Waters"

hether progressive or conservative, people agree that we are living in a tumultuous time. It puts people on edge, which in turn heightens our political and economic divisions. It hamstrings the efforts of Congress to deliver the public services we expect from government. But as we think about it, it's possible to see some silver lining on these dark clouds. The seriousness of our predicament has served to heighten our awareness of the divisions that truly burden our common life. People are beginning to take more serious note of the astonishing gap between rich and poor, an ominous sign for any democratic society. That gap heightens the seriousness of many other disparities, such as inadequate housing, unaffordable child care, limited work opportunities, and lack of adequate health care. Many of these problems are connected with racial discrimination, a fact that has been increasingly recognized as well and often dramatized on our streets.

In the wake of this increased awareness, we are seeing a wave of concern among the nation's churches – including our own ELCA. As we would expect, that concern is being seen increasingly among our congregations, including



own. We can be thankful for this development because it is a genuine expression of our Christian faith in working for justice and a more healthy society. It signals to the secular world that churches have a meaningful and even significant role to play in the nation's quest for a fair and just society


