Psalm 1

Happy are those who do not follow the advice of the wicked.

Or take the path that sinners tread,

Or sit in the seat of scoffers; But their delight is in the law of the Lord, and on his law they meditate day and night.

They are like trees planted by streams of water, Which yield their fruit in its season, And their leaves do not wither. In all that they do, they prosper.


The wicked are not so.

But are like chaff that the wind drives away.

Therefore the wicked will not stand in the judgment,
Nor sinners in the congregation of the righteous;
For the Lord watches over the way of the righteous,
But the way of the wicked will perish.

Psalm 1 opens the prayerbook of the Bible (the Psalms) with a description of life as a choice between two ways: the way of life and fulfillment and the way of wickedness and death. Those who root their lives in God's Word are like a tree that is planted by water whose roots, even in dry seasons, are able to drink in nourishment so that its leaves do not wither. Those who follow the advice of the wicked or who walk in their own wisdom, on the other hand, are like chaff that the wind blows away – perishable, without substance.

In other words, through reading and meditating on Scripture, we draw up within ourselves the presence and wisdom of God, which gives us strength, resilience, flexibility, and sustenance during the storms and droughts of life. Without the steadying influence and guidance of God's Word in our lives, we are more susceptible to changing winds, dis-ease, uprooted lives.



To be sure, the psalm paints a neat and orderly world with a clear juxtaposition between what leads to life and what leads to destruction, but life – and people – are far more complex than this dual-system. Nevertheless, one point is clear: the more we engage with the Bible – the more we read it, ask questions of it, pray it, wrestle with it, talk about it with others, speak it, sing it, let it challenge us, and live it – the more we will learn the will and way of God. Our lives will be more shaped by God's desires for what is good and just than by what we want for ourselves. We will be more likely to have the resources to stand strong, to lean on and trust God, in difficult times. Our lives and our congregation will bear the fruit of God's wisdom and guidance when we are deeply rooted in the Scriptures.

Reading the Bible is one of the foundational spiritual practices of Jesus' followers. How does the Bible inspire and encourage your walk with God? What are some of your favorite Bible stories or verses? What in those passages resonates with your spirit? What questions does the Bible raise for you?

One of the tools I'm using this summer in my personal devotions is called the SOAP method. It goes like this:

S for Scripture: Take a moment to deliberately read the scripture to yourself twice and allow God to speak to you. When you're done, look for one verse that particularly spoke to you. Write it down in a journal or notebook.

O for **Observation:** What do you think God is saying to you in this scripture? Ask the Holy Spirit to speak to you and guide you. Paraphrase and write down this scripture in your own words.

A for Application: Personalize what you have read by asking yourself how it applies to your life. Perhaps it is instruction, encouragement, revelation of a new promise, or a correction for a particular area of your life. Write down how this scripture applies to your life today.

P for Prayer: Think of a brief prayer inspired by this scripture verse. This can be as simple as asking God to help you use this scripture, or it may be a greater insight on what God is revealing to you. Remember, prayer is a twoway conversation, so take some time in silence to listen to what God has to say!

This process can be used alone, with another person or in a group. It is not about getting the "right" answer or the "perfect" prayer. It is about allowing God to speak to our lives and touch our hearts through the Bible, so that our roots are more firmly planted by the life-giving river of God's Word and our lives can then prosper to the glory of God!

"Troubling the Waters"

The horrendous tragedy of mass killings by young men, many of them teenagers, is profoundly disturbing. Churches and other religious organizations are among those urging Congress and state legislatures to enact laws that will reduce the incidence of these crimes, but the will has not been there.

Recently a group of religious leaders in Virginia urged their state legislators to take the following "common sense" actions:

- 1. Increase the age at which a person can purchase a gun. You can't buy alcohol till you are 21. You can't rent a car till you are 25. Given how many mass shooters are teenagers, and given the science of brain development, raising the age of gun ownership makes sense.
- 2. Ban assault weapons and bump stocks. These military-style weapons have no place in communities.

3. Require safe storage of guns when children are present. Gun owners should be required to store their guns safely when children

Healing of the Church are present in their homes.

So what can we do? Our prayers for the victims of gun violence and their families and communities should lead us to action. We can contact our representatives in the state legislature and Congress (we know that most of our citizens want Congress to require universal background checks, an eminently sensible requirement). The more insistent we are, the more likely that meaningful actions will finally get done.
