Pastor's Pen

"Are any among you sick? They should call for the elders of the church and have them pray over them, anointing them with oil in the name of the Lord. The prayer of faith will save the sick, and the Lord will raise them up; and anyone who has committed sins will be forgiven. Therefore confess your sins to one another, and pray for one another, so that you may be healed. The prayer of the righteous is powerful and effective."

James 5:14-16

hroughout his ministry, Jesus healed people. Crowds flocked to him to hear the good news he preached, to be fed by him, and to receive healing from him. Sometimes he healed from a distance; sometimes he touched the person being healed. Sometimes he used physical objects like mud, sometimes he spoke special words, and once, healing flowed out of him when a woman merely touched the hem of his robe. He healed people from mental distress, physical ailments, and spiritual burdens.

Humanity is unavoidably afflicted by various forms of illness, pain, suffering. Some wounds can be healed with ointment and a bandage. Other wounds require serious medical care, medications, support groups, or therapy before they are healed. And for some illnesses and pains, there is no cure. Nevertheless, as followers of Jesus, we believe that the power of God is present in our lives to bring healing, peace, and strength. Therefore, the Church continues Jesus' ministry of healing in a variety of ways, including the administration of the Sacraments, the forgiveness of sins, visitation of the sick, the laying on of hands, and prayer.

We will be including a Service of Healing during worship on October 16. You will be invited to come forward, if you so desire, for prayer for yourself and for others. You may come to receive a word of blessing and prayer; you may receive a physical gesture of healing: the laying on of hands and the anointing with oil. These signs were first given to us in baptism, reminding us that we are sealed by the Holy

Spirit and marked forever with the cross of Christ, who is health and salvation for the world. Whatever burdens we carry, God wills life and wholeness for us, and so we come forward to lay before God our places of brokenness and sorrow and sickness to receive that healing that the Holy Spirit will give us.

The healing ministry of the Church does not guarantee that all will be cured. Nor does it replace the gifts of God that come through the advances of modern medicine and the caring, persistent work of healing professionals. But we hold with confidence and faith that God heals and is a part of the healing process. We believe that miracles can happen; we also embrace the mystery of God's activity in our lives and in our physical, mental, emotional, and spiritual wellbeing. What the church offers and celebrates through its healing work is "God's presence with strength and comfort in time of suffering, God's promise of wholeness and peace, and God's love embodied in the community of faith" (Evangelical Lutheran Worship, page 276). During this intentional time of prayer, we entrust ourselves and all who are in need of healing to Jesus, who meets us in our times of distress and pain to fill us with light and hope, so that with the psalmist we too may sing:

Bless the Lord, O my soul, and all that is within me, bless God's holy name.

Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all God's benefits –

Who forgives all your sins and heals all your diseases;

Who redeems your life from the grave and crowns you with steadfast love and mercy.

(Psalm 103:1-4)

Amen.



FLC Book Discussion Group




For November, we dive into the very current topic of global warming as heard through Katharine Hayhoe's book Saving Us.
